- · I jar of peanut butter

- · 1 oz box of raisins
- *IF desired, 12-ounce pack of semi-sweet chocolate chips

Directions:

- · Gather all the ingredients
- · Carefully cut the apple into small wedges.
- · Lay the apples down on their side.
- Scoop half a teaspoon of peanut butter and spread it on one side of the apple.
- Place the raisins in the peanut butter. (If adding chocolate chips, mix chocolate chips in with the raisins)

After School Honey Cheerio Bars

After a long day of learning, we could all use a little something sweet. We've provided a recipe for our favorite peanut butter honey Cheerio bar. It's the perfect four-ingredient, easy-to-make snack!

Ingredients:

- · I thesp coconut oil
- · 1/2 CUP of honey
- 1/2 cup of peanut butter
- 3 cups of multi-grain Cheerios



Directions:

- Place wax paper in a square baking dish (either 8x8 or 9x9) and set it to the side.
- In a large stovetop pot, melt the coconut oil over medium heat.
- Add in honey and peanut butter and stir until everything is hot and well combined.
- Remove from heat and mix in Cheerios. Pour into your baking dish and press down firmly.
- Refrigerator for a minimum of an hour. Then cut into 2-inch squares.
- Store leftovers in an airtight container in the fridge.



DIY Backpack Tags

Supplies:

- · Duct tape sheets in colors of choice
- 3 inches x 5 inches piece of clear film, acetate or
- clear plastic bags from
- duct tape sheets
- · Scissors

- · Colorful rings
 - · Old throw-away business cards
- · X-Acto knife
- Straight edge
- · Hot Glue
- · Glue gun

PIY Backpack Tags

Instructions:

• Cut a piece of clear film, acetate or clear plastic bag. Set it aside.

* Aim to have a size of 4 1/2 inches by 3 1/2 inches.

• Cut two pieces from a duct tape sheet.

* Aim for the pieces to be 5 1/2 inches by 3 1/2 inches.

• To make the loop, cut a strip of duct tape.

* Aim for the strip to be 6 inches by 1 inch.

- Fold the edges to the middle of the sticky side and press flat. Fold this piece in half. Set it aside.
- Take one of the 3 1/2 inches by 5 1/2 inches pieces of Juct tape and, using the X-Acto

knife, cut a window for the ID information to be viewed. Cut little slits in the corner

of the window and fold the duct tape back to the sticky side.

* Place the clear film on the sticky side of the duct tape.

* Fold the outside edges back to the sticky side to give it a finished look. This

is the front piece of the tag.

• Take the second piece of 5 ½ inches by 3 ½ inches piece of duct tape and cut the window slightly bigger than the first window.

* Attach this to the inside of the front piece.

- Cut two more pieces of Juct tape that are ¼ inch larger than the finished front piece.
- · While sticking the two pieces together, insert the loop at the long end previously

made for hanging the tag. This will be the back piece of the tag.

- Hot glue the Front piece to the back piece.
- Attach the tag to your backpack!





Binder Covers

Take your kids' binders to the next level by letting them decorate and make the binders truly their own!

Supplies:


- · Binders
- · Washi Tape or Duct tape
- · Cardstock (3 pieces)
- Scissors



Instructions:

- Cut the card stock to fit the clear front binder flap.
- Grab your decorative washi tape or duct tape and begin to experiment with colors and styles.
- Try creating a pattern with different rows of similar styles of washi tape or duct tape.
- Repeat pattern on the next piece of cardstock for the back cover.
- Cut the card stock to fit in the clear plastic cover on the spine
 - of the binder.
- Repeat the same pattern used for front and back or try a new pattern.
- Enjoy your customized binder for the rest of the year. You can easily swap it out or redesign it as desired.







Monster Corner Bookmarks

Instructions:

- · Start by folding one of the colored pieces of paper in half.
- Fold the left and right corners to the center point.
- Cut off the excess part and cut through the middle to get two triangles.
- · Unfold the triangles to have two squares.
- Fold the squares in half to get a rectangle.
- Fold the rectangle in half again the other way to make a square.
- · Unfold the square to see four small squares. Cut one square out.
- Now cut the adjacent two squares from the one you've cut out diagonally through the square.
- · Fold the little triangles inward.
 - * Apply some glue or tape to the inner one.
- Use the other colored paper to make a tongue, eyes, some crazy eyebrows or even horns.
- Once desired additional items have been cut, attach them with glue or tape to either the inside or outside of the monster. For best results attach the tongue to the inside of the monster's mouth and the teeth to the outside of the monster's mouth.
- Place monster corner bookmark in the top corner of the book as you are taking a break from reading to keep your place.

Mason Jar Supply Holders

Stay organized this school year with these different mason jars. Pencils, glue sticks, paint brushes, crayons and more, these jars will keep your supplies organized this school year.

Supplies:

- Mason jars
- White primer paint
- Pencil
- · Acrylic paint
- Paint pens

- Paintbrushes
- · Green card stock
- · Washi or painter's tape
- Sealant (optional)
- · Old newspaper

Mason Jar Supply Holders

Instructions:

- Place old newspaper down to cover your workspace and protect it from paint spills.
- Place the jar's mouth down on the newspaper and spray evenly with white primer paint.
- · Sketch out the different designs with a pencil.
- Paint the mason jars using acrylic paint. You may need 2-3 layers of paint depending on the thickness.

* For any straight lines, use washi tape or painter's tape to mark the edges.
* For thin lines, use paint pens as opposed to paintbrushes.

· For different designs:

- * Pencil: use pink paint at the bottom of the bottle and fill ¼ of the jar, then use grey paint for a small ½ inch strip and then yellow paint on the rest of the jar to design a pencil. Paint the lid black.
- * Calculator: use grey paint all around except for a rectangle about a $\frac{1}{2}$ inch below the lid. Then outline 16 squares in a 4 x 4 formation. Paint

the rectangle white and the squares green. Paint the lid grey.

- * Apple: Paint the jar red and the lid green.
- Glue: Paint the whole jar white except for a blue square in front.
 Paint the lid orange.
- · Add facial features if desired.
- Cut a leaf out of the green card stock for the apple jar and glue it to the jar.
- If desired use sealant to lock in the paint.


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
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
