
Character Value of the month: Cooperation

Infant and Toddler Innovation



Appropriate Expectations for Learning Academic Skills

Many child development specialists believe that the foundation for learning is built during the first three years of life. This may be scary though because the academic experiences we remember start at age 5 or 6. We think we have no idea how to teach other children, but everything parents do with their children is teaching! You actually have been teaching your child for quite some time. You started by teaching your child that you love him or her. Then, you taught your baby to depend on you. Then, you helped him or her figure out how to play with objects. Then, you helped your baby learn how to scoot to get something, and so forth. What you may not realize is how important these early skills are for later learning. Each time you interact with your child, you are teaching. And each positive, playful experience a child has builds potential for academic readiness and success.

Here's a list of activities that are guaranteed to lay the foundation for academic skills after age six. Do these now, before your child is ready for direct instruction in an academic environment!

- Read to your child every day.
- Share your work with your toddler. Toddlers want to do real work all by themselves. So, let them work with you. When you sort laundry, give your toddler a pile of socks to play with. Then ask him or her to put the socks in a different pile from the towels. They can also count out forks at the table, count plates as you take them out of the dishwasher, or even count stops signs as you drive along to school.
- Comment on what you are doing and why. It offers children ideas about connections that will have meaning later on.
- ❖ Use empty cereal boxes, cartons, and cans to create fun play things.
- **Hold** your child every day. Take time to reconnect emotionally. Eye contact is very important. Emotionally stable children make good students. Supporting emotional development is one of the most important things parents can do to prepare their children for academic success.
